They have five luxury tent facilities and three rustic campsites. There is no electricity, but the luxury camps have solar panels and the campsites are very nice, with ample space, a water point, a braai and a roofed lapa area.

There are two rustic but very inviting bathrooms, each with a large shower, basin and mirror, and flush toilet.

In the evenings the staff provide oil lamps at the campsites and the bathrooms. The showers have hot water from gas geysers, so there's no chance of running out.

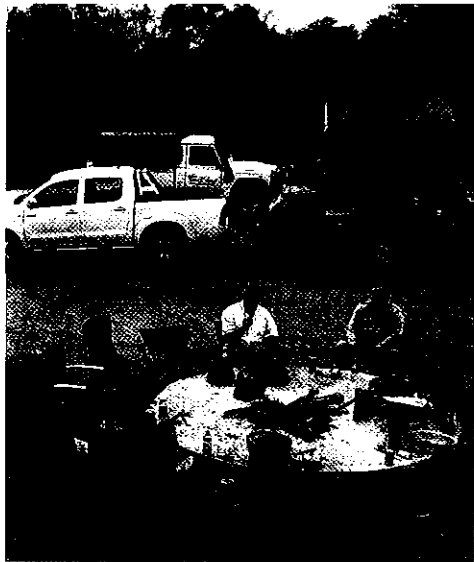
